OBJECTIVES

This course serves as an intensive introduction to phonological theory (the P side of grammar) at the graduate level (Master's). Upon completion of the course, students should be able to a) understand concepts associated with phonological theories and analyses, b) apply theoretical knowledge into practice, and c) construct arguments for phonological grammars.

PREREQUISITES/PRIOR KNOWELDGE

Although there are no official prerequisites for this course, students are expected to have good knowledge of phonetics and some basic knowledge of morphology.

1) Blackboard:

Research has shown that collaborative learning is effective in higher education, and I definitely subscribe to this view.
