





# What is a portfolio?

- It is a particular type of files in which you can present yourself as a writer.
- It contains a collection of writing assignments that your teacher will ask you to do + other important things such as:
- 1. comments from your teacher;
- 2. comments from your peers;
- 3. rubrics;
- 4. and grade

- The portfolio shows your performance, development, and accomplishments throughout the semester. In other words, it is an indicator of what you can do.
- The portfolio is used by your teacher to judge your progress.
- The portfolio has a life-time purpose. It is a reference of your wonderful pieces of writing that you can use it to observe your growth development, or when you apply for job, for example. Also, it is an evidence of your abilities as a writer.



# Why having the portfolio?

You are probably wondering why you should go through the trouble of designing, collecting, arranging, carrying, etc. while you can simply use writing paper to submit your work. Well, **the portfolio is designed** to help you improve your writing techniques. It is not just a file where you keep your writing assignment. How to keep your writing work, and what other contents to include in your portfolio is what makes it different and special. As you progress through the semester, you will see how the portfolio is helping you developing your writing.





# Getting started:

Here is what you need to create a writing portfolio:

#### 1.File:

Get the file that you like, but it should not be smaller than A4 size.

#### 2.Cover:

Personalize the cover of your file. Let it show your beautiful character.

## 3.Info page:

The info page should contain your personal information, that is:

a. Your name,

b.ID no.,

c.level,

d.and e-mail.

# 4. The portfolio collecting timetable


#### 5. Table of contents:

No one likes to get lost!

As you know, the contents of your portfolio will change with each assignment, so I suggest that update your table of contents after every three chapters.

#### 6.Grades sheet:

This sheet will include a list of your assignments and your scores.



#### 7.Drafts:

You should submit at least 3 drafts.

## ○1<sup>st</sup> draft:

The 1st draft is the planning of your topic.

# $\circ$ 2<sup>nd</sup> draft:

The 2<sup>nd</sup> draft is the first, or it could be the second, writing of your paragraph. This draft still has to be revised and edited.

○3<sup>rd</sup> draft:

and ready to be published. The final version must be typed, double space, and all margins should be set at 2 cm.

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## 8. Peer's response sheet:

This sheet is used by your peer. She should mention 3 favorite parts about your writing and 3 suggestions.

11.Reflection Statement



→ Your portfolio should follow this order.



The **reflection statement** serves a major role in determining the personality of the portfolio and establishing how well you have absorbed the lessons learned in the course. It also reveals a great deal about you as its author. It indicates how seriously you have taken the assignment, how successful you are at understanding the assignment requirements, and how much attention to detail you devote to your work. In fact, the reflection statement is the most valuable part of the portfolio.

# Getting Started:


The more exact your reflection statement is about the changes you made the your writing, why you made them, and the results those changes made, the stronger your portfolio in general will be. Such careful description indicates that you have truly worked hard and thought about your work.

So how does the reflection statement work?!

- Choose three assignments that represent the best of you as a writer.
- Make the necessary changes that have been suggested by your teacher and your peers.
- For each assignment, write down your mistakes and the changes you made after your revision.
- It is best that you reflect on each assignment, so when it is time for your reflection statement the process will not be difficult.

A teacher said once, "Look at the <u>first draft</u> of the first paper you wrote this semester (or your worst draft), then compare to the draft of the paper you thought was your <u>best</u>. How is it different? In actually writing the self-evaluation, you should mention which paper you thought was your best, and explain why in detail."

# Student 3

#### **Reflection Statement**

Throughout the course of my first year in college, I think my writing has improved remarkably. I have always enjoyed writing, and I usually use proper grammar, mechanics, punctuation, etc. However, this year I have learned to write more effectively using complex sentences and active voice, yet also being concise in my thoughts and ideas. I have also learned many argumentative strategies that are resourceful when trying to persuade audiences. I notice an improvement in each of my writings as the semester passed, and learning to write more professionally and still appeal to the reader.

My first paper, an argumentative essay about globalization, had very few mechanical errors. Only a small number of structural changes were required, so I had to revise once more and make the necessary adjustments. Mainly, I needed to make my ideas more specific and to present my point  $\rightarrow$  The writer introduces her briefly. For example, I used prepositional phrases and examples. I also used relative clauses.

My second paper was about city life. Like my first paper, this one didn't have many grammatical errors, but it did have a few organizational problems. To correct these, I moved a couple of sentences around so that each sentence in every paragraph was related to the topic sentence of that paragraph. As always, there were some words that I changed and omitted in order to make the sentences sound better and more suitable.

My last paper, a descriptive paragraph about the ceremony of Eid Alfeter, had some minor errors that needed to be corrected. I had to clarify a few points and rearranged few sentences so that it could be understood better. Mainly, I changed several "be" verbs to action verbs and got rid of many passive sentences as possible. This helped to make my paper more interesting and to the point.

I have noticed several improvements in my writings as I progressed throughout this semester. have to write using remediately verbs as possible and do away with needles words and phrases. To more professional, I have also tried to cut down on short sentences, and write make my writing so ate, sopheticated sentences. However, I still attempt to organize my ideas so that they are more ela to the reader. I learned to use three strategies: avoid generalization, to write specific and interesting toxic sentences, and how to organize a narrative essay. I now know that writing can be a very effective treans of communication, and when done correctly, it can even be better than speaking. If I continue to work on these areas of my writing, especially sentence structure and organization, I think I can become a good, maybe even great, writer as I continue in college and the rest of my life.
